The illusion of Personal Data Privacy

It is already known that there has been a recent increase in global government demand for information caused by the demands of the private sector, along with an increase in government demands for direct access to private sector databases or networks. Documents describing programs containing massive-scale government access to telecommunications and Web metadata have been declassified in reaction to disclosures by former National Security Agency contractor Edward Snowden. Everything is being monitored even the information we all consider as strictly private and confidential.

Based on an analysis of law and practice in 13 nations, in most, if not all of the countries surveyed, it is proven that the law provides an insufficient framework for systematic access, not only from a human rights perspective but also on a practical level.

Systematic surveillance programs are focused on secret government interpretations of the law which often lead to ambiguity between public law and government practice. In fact, a comprehensive, global debate on criteria for government surveillance, focused on greater transparency of current practices should be included in the global agenda; international human rights law provides a useful basis for this debate. It is about time it was taken seriously.
