One Hundred Ninety-Three Countries - One Logo




"Blue is the opposite of red, the war colour", Oliver Lincoln Lundquist had said. Everybody has seen the flag of the United Nations, but it so seems that very few people actually know how it was first created, by whom, and what it represents.

Mr. Lundquist was the architect and industrial designer who led the team that created the United Nations logo in 1945. Their first task was to design the graphics for the San Francisco Conference at which the United Nations Charter was to be signed. The team was responsible for designing an official delegate's badge but it turned out that the badge later became the prototype for the official UN logo. The distinctive blue colour was chosen to represent peace, although back then the hue was slightly grayer and paler than today's design.

The logo shows a map of the world in an azimuthal equidistant projection centred on the North Pole, which means that all countries and points on the map are at equal distance from the center point, thus implying that all countries are equal to each other and no one is better or more important than the other.

Finally, the world map, together with the wreath of the two surrounding olive branches, represent the Organization's mission and quest to attain worldwide peace and security as well as foster cooperation among nations.

Get to know the committees of ATSMUN (Part 2)

SoCHum

Social Cultural Humanitarian Committee is all about the protection of human rights, the advancement of women, the protection of children, indigenous issues, the treatment of refugees, the promotion of fundamental freedoms through the elimination of racism and racial discrimination, and the right to self- determination. In the third ATS MUN this committee is going to discuss two issues, the labour conditions in the Least Developed Countries and the tackling violations of the freedom of political expression, as well as the rights of workers and the illegal conditions that they work, as well as the right of freedom of speech.

SpecPol

The Special Political and Decolonization Committee considers a broad range of issues covering a cluster of five decolonization-related agenda items, effects atomic radiation. questions relating to information, a comprehensive review of the question of peacekeeping operations as well as a review special political missions. Delegates will have the opportunity to express their opinion on current political matters and combine their ideas in an effort to find a solution for the problems stated above (and maybe more as current political affairs seem to have created a wider range problems).

WHO

The World Health Organization is a specialized Agency of the United Nations which concerned with international public health. It was established on 7 April 1948 headquartered in Geneva and as of 2016 the WHO has 194 member states. The goal of this organization is combat diseases infectious diseases like influenza and HIV and non-communicable ones such as cancer. The topics that will be discussed on the 3rd ATSMUN towards the World Health Organization are the development of global standards for responding to epidemics and promoting medical research in Africa and Asia.

EU-UK Brexit

The relationship between the EU and the UK has always been complicated. Since the UK's accession to the European Economic Community (ECC) in 1973. The UK has had numerous opt-outs from several treaties and special statuses during its time at the European project. In ATSMUN 2018, the subjects that will be debated are a UK-EU security that includes the impact on defense spending, industry and research and if UK could remain in the common market after their exit from the European Union.
